## THE FRIENDSHIP ARCH ... IT'S ORIGIN ... IT'S PURPOSE

In the December 1967 issue of "The Lion" magazine there appeared a photograph of the Friendship Arch erected by the Lions Club of Olympia, U.S.A. at the international border separating Sumas, State of Washington, U.S.A. and Huntingdon, British Columbia, Canada. By this gesture, the Lions Of Olympia wanted to make known their friendship towards the Lions of the Canadian Province and in a much wider sense, the friendship that is to exist between the Lions of the two countries, already united to SERVE their fellow man under the same motto and the same emblem.

The photograph and its legend inspired Past International Director John O "Jack" Filkin with the idea of having a similar arch installed in Windsor, Ontario, the cradle of Lionism in Canada to commemorate the Windsor Downtown Lions Club's 50th Anniversary in 1970.

The Governor's Council readily accepted the project outlined by Lion Jack, and gave him authorization to solicit donations from the Clubs in Ontario and Quebec to be used to purchase an arch from the American manufacturer. The Clubs proved to be most generous and contributed an amount in excess of \$3,000.00.

At the request of Past Governor Clayton Rawlings of Windsor, the manufacturer provided him with a copy of the plans of his arch as well as information as to its cost. This cost was quite reasonable but the transportation and importation costs were rather high. It was at this time that Lion Russell Warner, Governor of District A-2, asked the Gerotti brothers, members of the Merritton Lions Club, if they could build an arch similar, but not quite identical, to the one for which the plans had been obtained. The Gerotti brothers submitted their own plans which were accepted.

In 1993, because of some problems with peeling and hands breaking off, it was decided and agreed on that a new Fiberglass Friendship Arch would be a lot more suitable. The advantages would be ease of shipping, handling and carrying as the total weight is only 200 pounds.

Since then Fiberglass Arches have been built and now with the previous arches can be seen in more than 200 locations in various parts of Ontario and Quebec.

At first, besides the first arch to be erected in Windsor, the funds collected were to be used to erect other arches at border points separating U.S.A. municipalities from Ontario and Quebec. However, due to numerous governmental restrictions, this soon became impossible. The Governor's Council therefore decided that an arch could be erected in any area or location in full view of the public, in any municipality, large or small, wherever existed a Lions Club.

The \$3,000.00 raised originally enabled the committee to donate several arches but, as the requests for arches increased, PDG Russ Warner, Chairman of the committee, asked for and received authorization from the Governor's Council to hold a draw for Lions



Vests covered with pins donated by Clubs, Districts and generous Lion members. The profit from the draw would serve to donate more arches. Since that time, the draw has been approved by each succeeding Council, year after year, including this year's Council.

Today, an arch costs approximately \$1,800.00. Inasmuch as there is a great demand for arches, the members of the Promotion and Friendship Arches Committee hope that all Clubs in Multiple District "A" will sell all 30 tickets in the book they will soon receive from their respective District Governor or his appointee. The stubs of the tickets sold, the money collected therefrom, the unsold tickets, if any and the pins we hope for, are to be sent to the District "A" Office.

Each in his turn, PID Filkin, and PDG's Clayton Rawlings and Russ Warner have passed on. Nevertheless, their project under the Chairmanship of PDG Moodie Campbell since 1986, survives and continues to grow and it is hoped it will continue for many more years.

In itself, an arch, even though it survives the test of time and the elements, is only an inanimate object. However, one must look at it as a symbol whose purpose is to show the citizens of a community that the Lions are their friends. The Lions emblem on an arch speaks for itself. The clasped hands cannot be other than those of two friends -- that of a Lion and his friend, his neighbor, and particularly the handicapped, the young and the elderly.

The Arch is and remains a symbol -- a visible and tangible sign of the Lions' Friendship towards One and All.



## LIONS CAMP DORSET

Lions Camp Dorset is gearing up for another year of operation. As many of you already know the camp is a vacation spot for kidney dialysis patients and their families. These clients come for a week at a time to have a holiday while still being able to receive their 'every other day' dialysis treatment. Their accommodation is provided in 3 bedroom cottages or 1 bedroom efficiency units. All their household needs are supplied except for their food and bedding. They use Lions Camp Dorset for 10 – 12 weeks from the end of June to the middle of September with a Thanksgiving Getaway in October as well. The Camp is available for rentals and functions in the 'off season'.

Prior to the Dialysis Clients coming, it is my responsibility as "Interior Design Director" (fancy words for the person who makes sure all the accommodations are clean, safe, comfortable, and high quality) to coordinate the major 'spring cleaning effort' that takes place from June 10 – 19, 2005. To this end, I am asking, on behalf of Lions Camp Dorset Corporation and the incoming dialysis clients, for your

help. At the last Board meeting the Directors decided to 'outsource' the major clean to a professional cleaning service to be done prior to June 10th. I still need volunteers to come up to the Camp either the weekend of June 10th – 12th or the weekend of June 17th - 19th to get this job done! The major part of this job is doing inventory, laundry of the bedding supplies, and putting the Camp back to readiness for the first week of operation. There are other jobs that must be completed as well. All light fixtures, plumbing, smoke detectors, fire extinguishers, doors, ramps, decks, and screens have to be checked and repaired if needed.

As all volunteers stay at the Camp while this work is done, meals must be provided so I also need cooks – all food is supplied by the Camp. We are also sending letters to clubs who sponsor a cottage or efficiency unit asking for their help with those specific units but there is more than enough to do for all those volunteering to help.

**The benefits to you** are the satisfaction of making a difference (a huge one) to someone less fortunate than

yourself, enjoying the fun and fellowship of working with other members of the Lions Family and the use of the pool and hot tub, library, games room, minigolf course and the other recreational activities available to you at the Camp.

**You need to bring** your clothing – comfortable –for cool and warm weather (as well as sometimes damp), bedding for single or double bed, towels, snacks, liquid libations, tools if you so desire and lots of bug repellent!

I need to know how many are coming for food supplies and accommodations so I need an **RSVP by June 1st.**

The success of this undertaking depends on you accepting this challenge! Try it – you might like it!

### LOBSTER OVERLOAD!

Each year about the end of May, the Russell Lions Club holds an "All you can eat" Lobster Feast - this has been going on for nearly twenty years! It is held on the ice slab at the Russell Arena, and we now serve about 850 patrons each event. - we have been sold out for the last ten years.

The format is this: our patrons can arrive anytime after 5:00 PM to get their favourite places - Refreshments are available. At 7:00 PM, dinner is served. Hungry patrons line up in four separate lines, and are served lobster, a variety of salads, roast beef, buns, desert, coffee, etc. We can get everyone through the lines the first time in about 25 minutes! After that, the folks keep coming back until they're full, or 9:00 PM arrives, whichever is first. After a cleanup, there's a dance with a DJ.

Each year, our Club realizes a profit of \$10K - 12K. Our donations go to several dozen causes: among them are Tsumani Relief, Sight First, a new Helipad for the Russell Fire Department, and the Winchester and District Memorial Hospital.

Be aware though: this type of event is not for the "weak-of-heart". It took over 100 Lions, Lion's families and friends, and student volunteers to pull it off. And the lobster we served cost \$32,000 !!

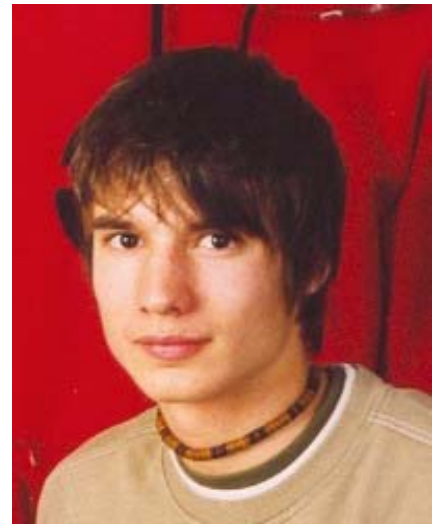

### Lions Clubs Have an Opportunity to Help a Young Man Restore His Sight and to Make History

A young husband and father in Smiths Falls has the chance of a lifetime to have his sight restored. Mark Leach, a 33 year old businessman operates, along with his wife Danielle, a family business known as Marks Auto Care Ltd. in Smiths Falls.

Mark suffers from a rare eye condition known as Leber's Optic Atrophy- a disease which left him with only 15% of his optic nerve remaining. He now has an opportunity to have experimental surgery performed which will inject OEG cells at the front and back of his optic nerve with the hope of bridging a connection which will restore his sight. Mark and his family became aware of this procedure which can be performed in China at the Chayang University Hospital of Medical Sciences in Beijing. After consulting with his local physician he contacted the doctor in Beijing and it was determined that he would be a good candidate for this revolutionary new procedure. Mark will be the first person in the world to receive this treatment.

After careful consideration, Mark and his family have decided to go ahead with the operation. They will be traveling to Beijing in November 2005. The total cost of the procedure, travel, and accommodation for one month in China is approximately \$50,000. Insurance does not cover any of these expenses.

The family has been trying to raise the funds through many community events such as raffles, 50/50 draws, dinner dances and a fishing derby. The town has rallied to support Mark but more needs to be done. In response the Smiths Falls Lions have agreed to administer a trust fund for the Mark Leach eyesight restoration fund.

On behalf of the family and the Smiths Falls Lions Club I would like to ask that all Lions Clubs in District A-4 and beyond support these vital community efforts to restore the sight of Mark Leach.
